From Rev. Jane, Missional Priest in Charge

The season of Epiphany has been full. We have heard in our scripture that the Holy Spirit gives each of us unique gifts. When we use these gifts for their intended purpose to love and serve one another and God, we will experience profound fulfillment. We may also face resistance as we live out our call, but no matter what God calls us blessed and asks us to become a blessing to others.

Throughout Epiphany we have also set aside time in each of our services to celebrate the many people who help the church thrive. We celebrated and honored the good work of Matthew, our Director of Music Ministry, and the choir. The church welcomed me as the official priest in charge and prayed over me that I would be guided and sustained by God. We celebrated how the altar guild, quilters, counters, and buildings and grounds volunteers have all worked to honor and tend the material goods that God has given us from His creation. We honored and gave thanks for the 2018 Vestry and all the work they did in a year of such transition and we welcomed the new 2019 Vestry and prayed that God would help them serve the spiritual needs of our community. We honored all of our greeters, readers, and chalice bearers and gave thanks for the sacred work that they do in helping all of us worship God. Finally we celebrated our children, the incredible work that Karen has done to sustain and grow the children's ministry and we welcomed and bless our new children's ministry team.

We are in a new era of ministry in our world and our church. We have access to seemingly endless information. We can simply shout out to Alexa and get answers to questions ranging from "what will the be weather today?" to "Why are people starving in the world?" While we have access to so much information, we also know that Siri cannot answer our deepest questions. Who am I? What is my purpose? How can I feel fulfilled?

We believe that God knew us in our mother's womb and that he knows every hair on our head. We believe that the Holy Spirit gives us our gifts and roles and Jesus gives us a model for how to live our lives, how to find purpose and meaning in life.

We certainly are in a new era of ministry in our world and church and we each have so much to offer one another, our church, and those searching for meaning in our community. I encourage you to continue to pray and ask God what your gifts are and how you can help others to discover their gifts and purpose.

Just as we each look to God for direction and purpose, our church right now is also looking to God for direction and a new way forward. During the season of Epiphany we have tried new things as a church. We have tried new prayers and celebrations. We have tried new songs, and we have held a training for our Sunday servers. We have also asked many people to start serving the church in a new ways. We will continue to try new things as we look for how God wants our church to move forward.

As each of us and as our church community steps out in faith to try new things and take risks, we should expect to see amazing things. We should expect to see our church grow deeper in faith and connection with one another and our local community in ways that we never thought possible. We should also expect to see some failure.

As we move forward, whatever may come, pray that God would guide and direct us as individuals and as a church.

From Todd Rossel, Our Senior Warden

I am grateful for the trust placed in me by the Christ Church community as I begin my service as your Senior Warden. Like most people that have filled this role in the past, it is not necessarily something I aspired to, but it felt like this was my time to step forward. There is no easy path for any small Episcopal parish these days, but I am as excited and optimistic about our church than I have been in a long time and I sense that view is shared by many others.

I am thankful for the talented members of our Vestry, a combination of continuing, returning, and brand new members. We welcome new perspectives and ideas and I think this Vestry represents all facets of CCT. I hope to encourage meaningful dialogue, ideas and consensus and enable each member's voice to be heard and no one's individual burden to be too great. We all share a desire to use the Vestry as a conduit for encouraging more involvement from others outside the Vestry, as small workgroup members, advisors, and contributors. In this new capacity, staring out at the many things we wish to accomplish, I am reminded more and more of the phrase, "many hands make light work." Highlights from our first Vestry meeting in February included commitments to building a new website, progress on securing tenants for the Rectory, taking steps to create a new endowment from the Wallace family gift, reviewing and providing feedback on Rev. Jane's goals and objectives for the year, and establishing a new structure of matching small teams to key responsibilities (moving away from past model of "one member/one commission").

My personal goals as Senior Warden are purposely limited to a few:

- 1) Do all I can to make Rev. Jane's first year with us as successful as possible, promoting and supporting her goals and agenda as our spiritual leader, and further promoting her integration into this community and her vision of what we can become.
- 2) Help maintain the positive trends and operational health of the church, making good decisions and promoting wise stewardship of the many blessings that have come our way over the past year. That also involves keeping our minds and hearts open for new opportunities to grow and change as needed.
- 3) Expand awareness throughout the parish that we are now fundamentally different: We are a "missional church." The most obvious sign of our changed status is having a part-time rector who no longer lives across the parking lot and can run over to the office whenever something pops up, whether it is a spiritual need or a leaky pipe. This is a new experience in the life of CCT and with it comes an evolutionary shift in how we view our relationships with, and our responsibilities toward, each other, Rev. Jane, the surrounding community, and God. This is truly a "work in progress."




From Todd Rossel (continued)

Episcopal bishops met with lawmakers on background check bills as gun deaths mount



From the ECCT blog: Following God's Footsteps of Mercy



I've lived a privileged life of callings. In middle school, I learned what it meant to be a counselor, and being a young woman raised in the church, I took this as a sign and began voraciously and zealously pursuing a higher education in psychology, starting with a Christian college. A mentor of mine pointed me toward Houghton College, and after my first campus visit, I fell in love, and once my Houghton acceptance letter came in the mail my mind was set; God wanted me at Houghton, and I was going. I was ready to leave home. I was ready to see the world (the world being upstate New York Amish-country, but, hey, this is wildly different than southeastern Connecticut!). I had big ideas, and an advocacy-heart, and I was ready to change the world (remember when I said I wanted to see the world, and then I was ready to change it? welcome, naïveté). My first year in college threw me. All of a sudden I was required to think for myself; it wasn't until I reached higher education, with all its reflection papers and theological discourse, that I was thrust into a world of opinions and theory. I was losing myself and finding myself: in God, in my relationships with others, and in my classes. Rapidly, God was becoming more real, and not just in a romanticized way of callings and martyrdom, but in a way that challenged, pushed, and shaped me into a woman of Christ.

Fast-forward to me being led to Fuller Theological Seminary to pursue my doctorate in psychology.





If you would like to support the Trumbull Food Pantry, donations can be made directly at The Center at Priscilla Place between the hours of 9 :00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. If a large donation is being made, please contact them ahead of time at 203-452-5198 so they can assist you.

In addition to the Food Pantry drop off site, there are two community drop box locations: Trumbull Library – Main Branch on Quality St. and Trumbull Stop & Shop.
