The Word of the Lord

Salutation

The Celebrant says to the people

The Lord be with you.

People: And also with you.

Celebrant: Let us pray.

The Collect of the Day

Lord, we pray that your grace may always precede and follow us, that we may continually be given to good works; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. *Amen*.

The Old Testament 2 Kings 5:1-3, 7-15c

Naaman, commander of the army of the king of Aram, was a great man and in high favor with his master, because by him the LORD had given victory to Aram. The man, though a mighty warrior, suffered from leprosy. Now the Arameans on one of their raids had taken a young girl captive from the land of Israel, and she served Naaman's wife. She said to her mistress, "If only my lord were with the prophet who is in Samaria! He would cure him of his leprosy."

When the king of Israel read the letter, he tore his clothes and said, "Am I God, to give death or life, that this man sends word to me to cure a man of his leprosy? Just look and see how he is trying to pick a quarrel with me."

But when Elisha the man of God heard that the king of Israel had torn his clothes, he sent a message to the king, "Why have you torn your clothes? Let him come to me, that he may learn that there is a prophet in Israel." So Naaman came with his horses and chariots, and halted at the entrance of Elisha's house. Elisha sent a messenger to him, saying, "Go, wash in the Jordan seven times, and your flesh shall be restored and you shall be clean." But Naaman became angry and went away, saying, "I thought that for me he would surely come out, and stand and call on the name of the LORD his God, and would wave his hand over the spot, and cure the leprosy! Are not Abana and Pharpar, the rivers of Damascus, better than all the waters of Israel? Could I not wash in them, and be clean?" He turned and went away in a rage. But his servants approached and said to him, "Father, if the prophet had commanded you to do something difficult, would you not have done it? How much more, when all he said to you was, 'Wash, and be clean'?" So he went down and immersed himself seven times in the Jordan, according to the word of the man of God; his flesh was restored like the flesh of a young boy, and he was clean.

Then he returned to the man of God, he and all his company; he came and stood before him and said, "Now I know that there is no God in all the earth except in Israel."

Lector: The Word of the Lord. *People: Thanks be to God.*

Psalm 111 (said responsively by whole verse)

Leader: Hallelujah!

I will give thanks to the LORD with my whole heart, * in the assembly of the upright, in the congregation.

People: Great are the deeds of the LORD! *

they are studied by all who delight in them.

Leader: His work is full of majesty and splendor, *

and his righteousness endures for ever.

People: He makes his marvelous works to be remembered; *

the LORD is gracious and full of compassion.

Leader: He gives food to those who fear him; *

he is ever mindful of his covenant.

People: He has shown his people the power of his works *

in giving them the lands of the nations.

Leader: The works of his hands are faithfulness and justice; *

all his commandments are sure.

People: They stand fast for ever and ever, *

because they are done in truth and equity.

Leader: He sent redemption to his people;

he commanded his covenant for ever; *

holy and awesome is his Name.

People: The fear of the LORD is the beginning of wisdom; *

those who act accordingly have a good understanding;

his praise endures for ever.

The Epistle

2 Timothy 2:8-15

Remember Jesus Christ, raised from the dead, a descendant of David-- that is my gospel, for which I suffer hardship, even to the point of being chained like a criminal. But the word of God is not chained. Therefore I endure everything for the sake of the elect, so that they may also obtain the salvation that is in Christ Jesus, with eternal glory. The saying is sure:

If we have died with him, we will also live with him;

if we endure, we will also reign with him;

if we deny him, he will also deny us;

if we are faithless, he remains faithful--

for he cannot deny himself.

Remind them of this, and warn them before God that they are to avoid wrangling over words, which does no good but only ruins those who are listening. Do your best to present yourself to God as one approved by him, a worker who has no need to be ashamed, rightly explaining the word of truth.

People: Thanks be to God.

The Gospel

Luke 17:11-19

Deacon: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to Luke. *People:* Glory to you, Lord Christ.

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered a village, ten lepers approached him. Keeping their distance, they called out, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" When he saw them, he said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as they went, they were made clean. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. He prostrated himself at Jesus' feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? But the other nine, where are they? Was none of them found to

return and give praise to God except this foreigner?" Then he said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well."

The Nicene Creed

The Peace


Celebrant: The peace of the Lord be always with you. *People: And also with you.*

The people stand or kneel. The Celebrant continues

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all.

He stretched out his arms upon the cross, and offered himself, in obedience to your will, a perfect sacrifice for the whole world.

The Celebrant continues

On the night he was handed over to suffering and death, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore we proclaim the mystery of faith:

Celebrant and People

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

The Celebrant continues

We celebrate the memorial of our redemption, O Father, in this sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving. Recalling his death, resurrection, and ascension, we offer you these gifts.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him. Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ: By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *Amen*.

And now, as our Savior Christ has taught us, we are bold to say,

All: Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy Name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Celebrant breaks the consecrated Bread. A period of silence is kept.

The Breaking of the Bread





TERESA OF AVILA, NUN 1582

Teresa is one of the most important mystical saints of the church and one of only four women declared a 'Doctor of the Church' (in 1970), due to her two seminal contemplative works, *The Way of Perfection* and *Interior Castle*. (Saint Catherine of Siena, Saint Therese of Lisieux, and Saint Hildegard of Bingen are the others.)

Teresa was born near Avila and became captivated by the lives of the saints as a young child. Following her mother's death, her father sent her to an Augustinian convent to be educated, but serious illness ended her studies. It was during her convalescence that she determined to enter religious life despite objections from her father. She became a postulant at a Carmelite convent. Her progress at the convent was interrupted by a three-year period of illness when she was forced to return home. Once she recovered, she left her father's home to reenter the convent.

Once established, she came to feel that the way of life at the Carmelite order was too easy and set about to reform the order by establishing a 'discalced' (sandals or barefoot) order of nuns. She traveled for 25 years through Spain establishing 17 convents of Reformed Carmelites, who lived a harsh and demanding rule.

Despite a constantly demanding schedule, Teresa wrote numerous letters that give us insight into her personality and thinking. She gained the respect of countless others who saw in her a way of loving God with true affection and deep commitment.

Teresa died following two years of illness. Her last words, 'O my Lord!, now is the time that we may see each other.'

Here is a prayer for you to offer in Wednesday Thanksgiving for the life and witness of Saint Teresa of Avila.

O God, by your Holy Spirit you moved Teresa of Avila to manifest to your Church the way of perfection: Grant us, we pray, to be nourished by her excellent teaching, and enkindle within us a keen and unquenchable longing for true holiness; through Jesus Christ, the joy of loving hearts, who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, on God, for ever and ever. Amen.
